1. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) experience in effectively utilizing federal funds and performing the activities proposed in the application.

Micah Ecumenical Ministries has operated as a supportive services and shelter provider since its creation in 2005. Even before the agency formalized, however, its services were loosely operated by its founding churches--nine congregations in downtown Fredericksburg whose history in homeless services dates to the early 1980's. Prior to receiving our first dime from HUD, Micah began operating a supportive housing program in 2008. The program started by identifying chronically homeless individuals with income, pairing them up and partnering with a single private landlord who was willing to rent to the population. Today, Micah works with a multitude of property owners and continues to grow its base of landlords through a housing locator, who is employed by Micah and shared by the community. A team of seven housing case managers, funded by various state, federal and private dollars, works with supportive housing participants. Micah has managed CoC funds for supportive housing since 2010 and consistently met all monitoring requirements. To date, less than 10 percent of those Micah has assisted off the street have returned to homelessness and chronic homelessness has declined by 56% as a result.

2. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) experience in leveraging Federal, State, local and private sector funds.

While this application is specific to the activities of the Journey Supportive Housing Program, that effort is highly intertwined in a larger system of wrap-around care funded by a variety of sources. All of Micah’s activities connect in a public/private partnership with the Rappahannock Area Community Services Board (RACSB). Through the state’s Partners Assisting in Transitions from Homelessness (PATH) grant, RACSB provides a full-time mental health outreach worker who has an office in our day center. The PATH grant also provides partial funding for a second case manager to facilitate the SSI/SSDI, Outreach, Access and Recovery (SOAR) program, one-time rent and security deposit assistance and household items for PATH-eligible people who are moving into housing. Our income development work is further supported by a Goodwill Employment Specialist and 1.5 SOAR-trained FTEs who focus on work readiness and disability support. These positions are funded by a combination of private sources and Virginia Housing Trust. Micah captures Virginia Homeless Solutions Program/Emergency Shelter Solutions dollars from the state in order to offer rapid re-housing services. It also operates additional permanent supportive housing grants through the CoC Homeless Assistance Program and the Virginia Housing Trust. Local governments have historically supported our winter shelter, and more recently contributed resources for rapidly re-housing unsheltered homeless. Micah's post-hospital respite shelter is supported by a crucial funding partnership with Mary Washington Hospital. The hospital commits \$130,000 to the program as a means of effectively offering discharge plans to homeless cycling through the hospitals. The program has been an incredible resource in stabilizing the hardest to serve before moving them into housing. Micah is committed to partnering with any provider whose services can help our clients stabilize in housing. As a result, we provide space in our Hospitality Center to many different organizations who visit to serve our clients. Some of these in-person partnerships are "on hold" due to the pandemic and virtual work policies from other agencies. The following community partnerships are still operating in some capacity, even if it is a reduced capacity due to the pandemic: a social services worker comes to our office three days a week to assist with food stamp and Medicaid applications; A representative from the Veteran's Administration works from the Hospitality Center once a week; DMV comes monthly to help folks with their identification needs; Virginia Cares (ex-offender support) provides weekly services, and the local HIV/AIDS organization comes monthly to offer testing. Micah is always in talks with other service providers about ways the programs can co-locate within our building and neighboring churches; resources are further leveraged through volunteers, who donate food, furniture, dollars and time each year. We are currently pursuing new funding and partnerships to strengthen the healthcare offerings available to people served across Micah.

3. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) financial management structure.

Micah is led by a 13-member board of directors, which includes nine individuals appointed by the founding congregations and three of those churches' clergy. The board appoints a governance, personnel, community relations, ministry and finance committee to handle operations. The board also keeps a pulse on guest feedback through an annual input session with program participants and targeted discussions with individuals at our day center. Micah's current finance policy includes guidelines for separation of duties, handling of deposits, disbursements and transactions, payroll, documentation, budgeting, capitalization, donations, joint ventures and whistleblowing. We also work with an outside accounting firm, who prepares our 990 and completes our audit annually. Separately, we maintain a document retention policy, personnel policy, conflict of interest policy and executive compensation policy. Daily finances are managed between the Board Treasurer, Executive Director, a Program Director/bookkeeper. Regular updates of client rent share is conducted by a Housing Stabilization Navigator and her supervisor, who oversees all of Micah's housing activities. Changes are reported to the Executive Director for approval. Administrative staff conducts quarterly monitoring of participant files and data in order to make program improvement recommendations. Micah representatives regularly attend CoC meetings and assume leadership roles on various committees and continuum projects. The executive directors of the community's homeless service agencies meet every month to finesse the local homeless assistance process, make sure partnerships are working and identify best practices.

In 2014, the COC adopted its first 10-year plan to end homelessness. That plan was updated two years ago. Housing staff also participates in monthly prioritization meetings, where community partners review by-name lists and identify the most vulnerable homeless families and individuals for housing programs, such as Journey Supportive Housing.

1. Provide a description that addresses the entire scope of the proposed project.

Micah Ecumenical Ministries is a multi-service agency that provides basic need help, case management, winter shelter, post-hospital respite, and income development, in addition to supportive and rapid re-housing services for Fredericksburg's homeless. These programs collectively serve more than 700 homeless persons in Planning District 16 each year. Micah's programs use a relationship-based model with preference for the chronic homeless.

The proposed project expands a community-wide effort Micah piloted (originally unfunded) in 2008 to create housing for those whose incomes, backgrounds and credit histories keep them cycling in shelters and on the street for extended periods. It targets homeless individuals who meet HUD's definition of "dedicated plus," whose vulnerabilities also make them the most frequent users of jails, hospitals, courts and police time. Micah partnered with the Virginia Coalition to End Homelessness and Corporation for Supportive Housing to develop the initial project in 2015.

That project was expanded in FY17, and this project will build up the staff capacity to serve this extremely high need group. Most candidates for this program overlap with the list of chronic homeless that the CoC has already developed from the HMIS system. The designated plus category has only been selected to accommodate for unique circumstances of frequent users, who may have been homeless for more than three years but have such extensive institutionalization that they do not have enough episodes to officially meet the chronic definition. Participants are selected from a community's by-name prioritization list, which assigns people to the appropriate program based on vulnerability. Micah makes units available by leasing scattered-site apartments in the community with HUD funding or placing eligible clients in units the agency owns outright. In both cases, participants pay no more than 30% of their income and work with a housing stabilization navigator to maintain their housing, increase their skills/income and improve their self-determination.

Apartments are inspected at least monthly for overcrowding, cleanliness, illegal activities, etc. The housing stabilization navigator engages other staff and community resources, as needed, to delve into clients' individual areas of struggle—from medication management and life skills to money management, substance abuse, mental health and work skills. Additional staff support includes a PATH outreach worker, who assists with mental health, and an income navigator, who can help with disability (SOAR) and employment. When possible, volunteer mentors and other residential supports compliment our core team. Case management from other service providers may also be leveraged when appropriate to staff capacity and the client's needs.

4A. Supportive Services for Participants

1. Describe how program participants will be assisted to obtain and remain in permanent housing.

Participants will be placed in scattered apartments, leased in the agency's name and subleased to the client. Participants pay their portion of the rent, 30 percent of their income, to Micah. A Housing Stabilization Navigator develops a success plan with the participant at the time of enrollment. He/she then works with the participant to overcome challenges that may jeopardize their housing. Participant apartments are inspected monthly. Program discharges ideally occur at the end of a lease term, when a participant can demonstrate the ability to assume the basic requirements of tenancy. At such time, the client may assume full responsibility for their unit with a lease in their name or staff will help them find another unit. Micah maintains a housing staff of four, which are additionally supported by a mental health worker, an income navigator and an employment specialist. As necessary, case managers from other partners may be leveraged for adequate support.

2. Describe the specific plan to coordinate and integrate with other mainstream health, social services, and employment programs for which program participants may be eligible.

An individual success plan guides each person's care. Those plans frequently include income or benefits-related aspirations. For some it may be getting disability or money management; for others it may be obtaining or maintaining employment, possibly even going back to school. Additional goals may include managing mental health/substance abuse, repaying fines, developing life skills or family reunification. Micah staff assists clients with their success plan in many ways--helping them take medication on a daily basis, job coaching, connecting them with professional services or expanding support in trouble areas. Outside supportive services, such as mental health/residential support services, are arranged, as appropriate.

Participants are also encouraged to take part in activities that help them stay busy and develop natural supports, such as volunteering, groups or church/social events. Challenges with community participation are discussed in order to grow productivity and job readiness. One of Micah's growing programs is Street Church, which is evolving to provide our unique neighbors with social opportunities, worship opportunities, and community service opportunities in a supportive environment surrounded by other clients with similar experiences, and/or Micah staff/volunteers who are patient with the time it takes for a client to get comfortable in a new social environment.

Micah's on-site income assistance program, Step Forward, prioritizes the needs of those who have been placed in housing. The program offers an income navigator, who assesses each person's income aspirations and develops a plan for achieving the most appropriate source. If that source is disability or other cash benefits, she assists with the application process. If employment/education are determined to be a part of someone's plan, the income navigator coordinates with our employment partners, who can help the individual by placing them in an internship as part of our "Bridge to Employment" program. These employment partners are accustomed to working closely with Micah staff in order to help our clients transition into their new positions, and build the skills and habits necessary to succeed in employment long-term. Staff also assists clients, as necessary, with obtaining and communicating with third party payee services.
